FOUNDERS HONORED

More than 100 people gathered on November 15 to thank Dick and David for the time, energy and love they have given in creating Quatrefoil and helping it grow. In his remarks, Dick said he feels like a parent, watching a sometimes obedient, sometimes rebellious child go out into the world on its own. Many of those who will be responsible for the continued growth of the library were present, receiving a charge to carry on the mission of the library: to serve the community and to educate society at large.

Those present also had the good fortune to hear about "the good/bad old days" from Quatrefoil author James Barr, who came from Oklahoma particularly to celebrate the occasion. Special thanks to the organizing committee, those who assisted the evening of the dinner, Lyle Taylor for the music and Mary Jean, who was the second-best-dressed fairy in attendance. Gifts were presented to David and Dick on behalf of the members, and a portrait of the two - which will hang in the library - was unveiled. Those who missed Dick in his new purple robe and David in his lavender cummerbund and new letter-jacket are invited to browse through the library photo album during their next visit.

QUATREFOIL AND THE LOFT COSPONSOR

The library is cosponsoring two events with The Loft. An Evening with Essex Hemphill will be presented at The Loft at 8pm Friday, January 31, 1992. Tickets are \$4 for Quatrefoil and Loft members, \$5 for others, and can be purchased at the door only. A reception will follow. Hemphill is a poet, performance artist, and publisher of Be Bop Books. He is the recipient of Fellowships in Literature for the National Endowment of the Arts and the D.C. Commission for the Arts. His work is featured in two critically-acclaimed black gay films: Looking for Langston and Tongues Untied.

The library will host a Lesbian poetry writing class with local poet Morgan Grayce Willow, also cosponsored by The Loft. Time will be divided between discussion of readings and response to student work. The class will meet at Quatrefoil, Mondays, January 27 through March 15, 7-9pm. The fee is \$104 for library members, \$119 for non-members. Space is limited to 16, with one full scholarship available. Contact the library for further details.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE LIBRARY:

Beginning this month, we will be featuring in depth reviews of recent library acquisitions. Thanks to the Acquisitions Committee for their contributions.

Odd Girls and Twilight Lovers: A History of Lesbian Life in Twentieth Century America, by Lillian Faderman. Using a wide variety of sources such a personal journals, interviews, unpublished manuscripts, popular magazine articles and traditional sociological research, Faderman documents the establishment of Lesbian subcultures, the relationship of class to the nature of the subculture, the importance of all-female environments upon the development of Lesbianism, the impact of feminism and Gay literature and the gradual destigmatization of the concept of Lesbianism. Although Faderman's reconstruction of Lesbian life in the earliest decades of the century primarily utilizes white middle-class women from the east coast, beginning with the 1920's, she makes a conscious effort to include a wide diversity of women from all socio-economic classes, ages, ethnic groups and geographical backgrounds.

Coming Out: An Act of Love, by Rob Eichberg. Eichberg is the well-known founder of "The Advocate Experience," a weekend workshop and retreat designed for gay men and women who wish to become more comfortable telling about who they are, how they feel about themselves and their sexuality and how they feel about coming out to family, friends and co-workers. Using actual letters from the participants in these workshops, Eichberg recreates the process of coming out, beginning with the private issue of self-understanding, sharing your unique experiences with a few carefully-selected people and finally integrating your sexuality with those with whom you professionally, familially and intellectually share your daily life.

The Zuni Man-Woman, by Will Roscoe. Roscoe is an historian and cross-cultural researcher on homosexuality and alternative gender roles who unfolds the rich tradition of the berdache, a tribal member who engages in cross-gender work yet remains an integral, productive and valued member of the tribe. Although this rich tradition has been documented in over 130 North American tribes, Roscoe focuses his attention on the Zunis to unfold the berdache tradition as well as to describe the conflicts created by the impact of Western religious, cultural and sexual mores. At a time when America is being challenged to integrate an increasingly wider array of people with varying cultural, social and sexual traditions and experiences into its current institutions, The Zuni Man-Woman has much to offer.
