Endowment Campaign Goes Public

At the October 16, 2011 event
celebrating Quatrefoil Library's
25th anniversary, the
library's "Eye on the Future"
endowment campaign was
publicly kicked off. At the event,



donors who wish to remain anonymous, issued at \$2,000 challenge for the endowment.

- The challenge at the anniversary celebration was met and narrowly exceeded, moving the endowment campaign toward its \$100,000 milestone.
- By the end of the campaign—December 31, 2013, Quatrefoil hopes to have raised \$300,000 for its endowment campaign. This amount will afford Quatrefoil about 20% of its current annual operating budget, which helps meet the all-volunteer organization's expenses, the largest of which are space-related needs such as rent.
- Founders David Irwin's and Dick Hewetson's collection of GLBT books "went public" February 1986. Now, more than 25 years later, GLBT experience and political priorities have changed, yet the need for knowledge of GLBT history and culture and a keen appreciation of GLBT media expressions endure.
- Quatrefoil Library is a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization. This simply means that donations are deductible to the extent permitted by law; year-end gifts may ease next year's tax burden for those who choose to itemize deductions.



A Few Words from the Head Quatrefoil Cataloger



I'm not actually the "head" anything at Quatrefoil; I just think the title is sort of amusing and ironic. Like everything at the Library, cataloging is definitely a team activity, and while I guess I could say I'm head cataloger of books since I'm the main person who does it, I get help from my friends Joan Samuelsen, Assistant Extraordinaire, and Arvid Nelsen, archivist at the U of M (including the GLBT Tretter Collection). Meanwhile, Barb Hutchins takes care of periodicals and Hank Herrmann and Phil Cooper take care of DVDs.

About the only good thing about being an unemployed Technical Writer/Library Paraprofessional is that I can go over to Q Library on a weekly basis and work on the new books we receive. Good thing, too, because as of the middle of November, we cataloged 1,950 items in 2010. That's a lot of stuff. But the best part is not the number, but that the majority of those items were donated by you, our members. While we have an acquisitions budget, there is simply no way we could get nearly as many items as we do because of you. And remember, not only is your donation a tax write-off for you, but we check all books that come through to see if the copy from you is in better shape than what we have on the shelf. If it is, we trade it out to ensure we have the highest quality materials for our members. With DVDs and CDs, we keep an extra backup copy in case the current circulating copies become scratched, worn, or lost. If we currently don't need something, it becomes part of our book sales, which greatly help by bringing in money to keep the library doors open.

My favorite part of going through new materials is seeing the sheer diversity. If it's been a while since you've come in and just looked at the titles we have on the shelves, I would strongly encourage you to do so. I've discovered a number of really great books by people I had never heard about or just didn't realize would be part of a GLBT collection. Ever hear of Saki? (The author, not the drink.) He only wrote from 1899 to 1916, but after I read three very short stories, I was hooked cand am making my way through hisb complete works. On the DVD front, we recently got in "Call her Savage" (1932) with the "It" girl Clara Bow. The reason it's a part of our collection is because of a three-minute scene in a gay bar, but it is something that would not be seen for decades once the Hayes Office enforced the new code in 1934.

While I started to write this column to let you know what




I purchased Missed Her from True Colors Bookstore this summer. My intent was to read it over the summer. Unfortunately, time got away from me.I was fortunate enough to find some spare time for reading during this past Thanksgiving weekend break. I finally finished the book. Missed Her is a collection of short stories written about Ivan's life. In this book, Ivan delves into family histories, good old

boys' clubs, small town dynamics, butch identity, femme appreciation, and long lost loves (among other topics).

I thoroughly enjoyed reading Missed Her. As someone who grew up in a pretty small town and spent a lot of time visiting family "up north," in an even smaller town, I could relate to much of what Ivan wrote about. Not only that, but Ivan touches on the queer experience and gender identity so simply that it was easy to relate to these stories, and even see myself and my experience in a number of them. My only complaint is that some of the stories were a bit too short for my liking. I wanted more. More details, more insights, more anecdotes.

Fortunately, some of the stories were just the right length. The story of Ivan's grandmother's loss, rediscovery, and eventual permanent loss of her first love was especially heart-touching for me. I would highly recommend this book to any queer, genderqueer, or transgender person who has dealt with their own struggles of being visibly queer, grown up in the frozen north, and/or who has any interest in gender identity and butch-femme.

I will donate the book to the library this weekend, so check the shelves, curl up with a nice warm beverage of your choosing, and sit down for a handful of good, short reads.
